DAY TRIP

Although the annual Dixon Studio Tour—held November 7-8 this year—takes the gold for a perfect day in the fertile Embudo Valley, about 26 miles southwest of Taos, explorers at heart may want to stay over in this vibrant community. As famous for orchards and organic farms as it is for its resident artists, Dixon boasts galleries, vineyards, two wineries with tasting rooms, local produce, and a half-dozen friendly bed-and-breakfasts. —Anne Z. Cooke

Since street signs are few in this rural village, it's a good idea to stop at the Dixon Co-operative Market for a map and one-ofa-kind gifts. The Co-op, a nonprofit service organization founded to benefit the community, sells locally grown produce, meats, and handcrafted items. Manned by volunteers, the market will be your lodestone. 215 State Highway 75.

"Farm Fridays" at El Bosque Garlic Farm puts just-picked garlic and other vegetables destined for the Santa Fe Farmers Market on sale the afternoon before. Buy enough organic garlic to treat all your friends, and stay long enough to meet owner Stanley Crawford, who spends his time writing when he isn't working on the farm. 88 County Road 64 (a dirt road off State Road 75). The Rift Gallery, the only gallery open Wednesday-Sunday (Monday and Tuesday 579-9179; riftgallery.com.

Stop for a cup of joe at Zuly's Café, Dixon's only eatery, which is known for its locally grown ingredients. A favorite of residents and visitors, the green chile cheeseburger (pictured) is unrivaled. Or opt for the chicken dishes prepared with farm-raised fowl.
